Course Goals: The primary purpose of this class is to strengthen the technical scientific writing and science communication skills of the student as well as broaden their understanding of research ethics in the field of Astronomy. Student knowledge of scientific writing with applications towards writing clear and competitive scientific proposals for funding will be advanced. Ultimately this class will help prepare the student prepare for their careers by teaching them about research ethics and advancing communication skills, written and verbal, as required in the professional practice of the Space Sciences.
